Species of the Month: (Late October/Early November)

Ivy Bee Colletes hederae



Ecology

The Ivy bee has only recently started appearing in the UK (first recorded in 2001) but since has spread over the south of England.

Ivy, which flowers in late September till early November, provides this bee with most of its pollen, hence the name. It is a mining bee which excavates nests on soft banks and cliffs, often in proximity to Ivy for feeding. **Identifying**

The next week or two is the perfect time to look out for Ivy bees; they have been recorded in Bournemouth in the past. ID tips to remember

- Look on Ivy;
- Ivy bees are large, about the size of a honey bee;
- They are hairy;
- They have broad banding on abdomen (this can be orangey in freshly emerged individuals but then fades)
- If you get a good enough look you will see they carry pollen down their legs instead of in sacks.

They do sting so please don't get too close!
